Five Moments for Hand Hygiene

Handwashing is a simple thing and it's the best way to prevent infection and illness. Clean hands prevent infections. Keeping hands clean prevents illness at home, at school and at work. Hand hygiene practices are key prevention tools in healthcare settings, in daycare facilities, in schools and public institutions, and for the safety of our food.

In healthcare settings, handwashing can prevent potentially fatal infections from spreading from patient and from patient to healthcare worker and vice-versa. The basic rule in the hospital is to cleanse hands before and after each patient contact by either washing hands or using an alcohol-based hand rub.

An estimated 2 million patients acquire in hospital infections annually. And 90,000 patients die from their infections.

Hand hygiene guidelines were developed by the CDC's Healthcare Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee (HICPAC), in collaboration with the Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America (SHEA), the Association of Professionals in Infection Control and Epidemiology (APIC), the Infectious Disease Society of America (IDSA).

Clean Hands Saves Lives: Emergency Facts

After an emergency, finding running water can be difficult. However, keeping your hands clean helps you avoid getting sick. It is best to wash your hands with soap and warm water for 20 seconds. However, when water is not available, you can use alcohol-based hand products made for washing hands (sanitizers).

When should you wash your hands?

Examples include:

- Before preparing or eating food
- ❖ After going to the bathroom
- After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has gone to the bathroom
- ❖ Before and after caring for someone who is sick
- ❖ After handling uncooked foods, particularly raw meat, poultry, or fish
- ❖ After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing
- ❖ After handling an animal or animal waste
- After handling garbage
- Before and after treating a cut or wound
- ❖ After handling items contaminated by flood water or sewage

Using alcohol-based hand sanitizers...

When your hands are visibly dirty, you should wash them with soap and warm water when available. However, if soap and water are not available, use alcohol-based hand sanitizers.

- Apply product to the palm of one hand. Note: the volume needed to reduce the number of germs on the hands varies by product.
- Rub hands together.
- Rub the product over all surfaces of hands until your hands are dry.

Washing with soap and water...

- 1. Place your hands together under water (warm water if possible)
- Rub your hands together for at least 20 seconds (with soap if possible).
 Wash all surfaces well, including wrists, palms, backs of hands, fingers, and under the fingernails.
- 3. Clean the dirt from under your fingernails.
- 4. Rinse the soap from your hands.
- 5. Dry your hands completely with a clean towel if possible (this helps remove the germs). However, if towels are not available it is okay to air dry your hands.
- 6. Pat your skin rather than rubbing to avoid chapping and cracking.
- 7. If you use a disposable towel, throw it in the trash.
- 8. Remember; if soap and water are not available, use a sanitizer.

Healthcare Indrusty Outlook

- ✓ As one of the largest industries in 2008, healthcare provided 14.3 million jobs for wage and salary workers.
- ✓ Ten of the 20 fastest growing occupations are healthcare related.
- ✓ Healthcare will generate 3.2 million new wage and salary jobs between 2008 and 2018, more than any other industry, largely in response to rapid growth in the elderly population
- Most workers have jobs that require less than 4 years of college education, but health diagnosing and treating practitioners are highly educated.

About 595,800 establishments make up the healthcare industry; they vary greatly in terms of size, staffing patterns, and organizational structures. About 76 percent of healthcare establishments are offices of physicians, dentists, or other health practitioners. Although hospitals constitute only one percent of all healthcare establishments, they employ 35 percent of all workers.

The healthcare industry includes establishments ranging from small-town private practices of physicians who employ only one medical assistant to busy inner-city hospitals that provide thousands of diverse jobs. In 2008, around 48 percent of non-hospital healthcare establishments employed fewer that five workers. In contrast, 72 percent of hospital employees were in establishments with more than 1.000 workers.



Employment in healthcare will continue to grow due to many contributing factors. The proportion of the population in older age groups will grow faster than the total population between 2008 and 2018. In addition, older persons have a higher incidence of injury and illness and often take longer to heal from maladies. As a result, demand for healthcare will increase, especially in employment settings specializing in gerontology care for the elderly.

Employment in home healthcare and nursing and residential care should increase rapidly as life expectancies rise and families are less able to care for their elder family members and rely on long-term care facilities.

OUT LOOK FOR AMT MEMBERS:

Medical Technicians [MT] and Medical Laboratory Technicians [MLT], Certified Medical Laboratory Assistant [CMLA], Registered Phlebotomy Technicians [RPT], Certified Laboratory Consultant [CLC]— Employment of laboratory workers is expected to grow by 14 percent between 2008 and 2018, faster than the average for all occupations. The volume laboratory tests continue to increase with both population growth and the development of new tests.

Registered Medical Assistants [RMA] – Employment is projected to grow 34%, much faster than the average, ranking medical assistants among the fastest growing occupations over the 2008-2018 decade. Job opportunities should be excellent, particularly for those with formal training and certification.

Registered Dental Assistants [RDA] – Employment is expected to grow 36 percent from 2008-2018, which is much faster than the average for all occupations. In fact, dental assistants are expected to be among the fastest growing occupations over the projection period.

Certified Allied Health Instructor [CAHI] – As the demand for healthcare workers increases so does the need for qualified, instructors to provide education for the people entering this booming industry.

Healthcare workers at all levels of education and training will continue to be in demand. In many cases, it will be easier for jobseekers with health-specific training to obtain jobs and advance their careers. Specialized clinical training is a requirement for many jobs in healthcare and is an asset even for many administrative jobs that do not specifically require it.


